Women of the Church

Throughout the history of the Methodist/United Church in Waterford, there have been various women's groups. The earliest one, to be mentioned in the records of Waterford UC Archives was the Women's Christian Benevolent Society, founded in 1885. In 1930, this group was renamed to the Ladies Aid and then, in 1930, the Woman's

Association (WA). They held bazaars teas and lectures in order to raise funds. Their main accomplishment was the gradual improvement and upkeep of the manse. This is supported in the minutes which mention that numerous items were purchased and furniture supplied. They were also community minded. In 1924, a motion was made to give \$25 to the Norfolk Hospital Fund for the Waterford Ward.

In 1888, the Woman's Missionary Society (WMS) was founded. Their particular interests were missions and outreach, assisting the needy. In 1950, the WMS gathered clothes for ladies, children and babies to be packed in "bales" to be sent overseas. This was an important part of their mission work throughout the 1950s. Their programmes sometimes included presentations about missions in Africa, India and Korea.

In 1953, the Eventide Federation was founded. The WA and WMS met in the afternoons. The Eventide Federation accommodated ladies who worked during the days. Some of their projects were packing Christmas baskets, setting up the nursery department, and visiting sick and shut-ins. Some of their members organized the Explorer and CGIT groups for young girls and teenaged girls.

These groups continued until 1962, when all of the women's groups within the United Church of Canada joined to form the United Church Women (UCW). Two groups (or units) were formed at Waterford UC, one which met in the afternoon and one in the evening. These two groups both supported the needs of the congregation and also promoted missions. For the first ten years of the UCW, the evening and afternoon units combined their effort on a number of projects to raise money for the church. An example of this was the candy booth at the Norfolk County Fair. There were many women who had memories of the hours spent making fudge to keep the candy booth stocked.

At Waterford United Church, as well as throughout Canada, it was becoming more difficult to attract the younger women to become active in a women's group. In 1972 the afternoon and evening units of the UCW amalgamated. However the work of the UCW continued. They donated thousands of dollars to charities, such as the H-N Women's Shelter, the Wesley Centre, the Mission and Service Fund of the UCC and the Mennonite Central Committee. The UCW had lots of fun, too. They held an annual Christmas Pot Luck Dinner as well as an outing. One year they went to the historic village at Sparta ON; another, they went to Rev. Larry and Ginny Wiegand's home at Peacock Point.

For many years, Quilting has been part of the work of the UCW and one of its predecessors, the WMS. The first quilting group to be sponsored by the UCW evolved from a small group of women who met at Mamie Pew's house on Main St. N in Waterford. The quilters made many of their quilts specifically for customers who had ordered them. The quilters charged for their work. In 1982, the quilters gave \$600, which they gave to the UCW for distribution. By 2002, they had raised approximately \$30,000 over the years, which they gave to the UCW for charities and mission work. For many years the quilters worked at the homes of Lillian Vince and Grace Wardlaw. After their passing, they moved to Janet Mayer's house.

As the years went by, the UCW became smaller and smaller. Members became older; they were unable to recruit new, younger members. Most women worked, and their jobs as well as other activities and interests took up their time. In 2020, the Waterford UCW made the difficult decision to disband.

The quilting group carried on quilting four afternoons a week at Janet Mayer's house until there were no more orders for them to make quilts and the number of quilters had dwindled to four. In 2024, the quilting group also disbanded.

However, women continue to play a vital role in the church. The UCW and other formal groups have disappeared from Waterford UC, but women are active in all the church functions locally, regionally and nationally.
