



FORMATION OF THE UNITED CHURCH OF CANADA

When I was a university student in Toronto, I and a number of my friends attended Rosedale Presbyterian Church and joined their Young Peoples group. For one of our Friday evening outings we decided to go roller skating at the Mutual Street Arena. I have a vague memory of it as being an older building, with a hip roof, barn like in appearance. It looked like it had been used a lot. I soon discovered that roller skating was not for me. I think I may have skated a few meters before taking off my rented skates and sat down to enjoy watching the others in our group enjoy themselves.

The Mutual Street Arena was an ice hockey arena and sports and entertainment venue in Toronto From 1912 until 1931, with the opening of Maple Leaf Gardens, it was the premier site of ice hockey in Toronto. It was located on Mutual Street, just south of Dundas Street East and two blocks east of Church Street in downtown Toronto. The Arena was also used for musical concerts, gatherings, and other sporting events. It was converted into a curling club and roller skating rink. At the time of its construction it was billed as the largest indoor arena in Canada and held about 7,500 for hockey, but when the ice was removed and chairs placed on the floor or the arena, 8,000 or more could be accommodated. The building was demolished in 1989.

It was here before 8,000 people that the United Church of Canada was born. A reprint of the first page of the Toronto Daily Star, June 20, 1925, tells the story very well, and I would like to quote it, in part:

"Within this arch-roofed edifice (of the Mutual Street Arena), a sea of faces gazed upon the platform where the covenant lay ready to be signed by the officials of the joining churches.

"A crashing chorus 'The Church's One Foundation' brought the assemblage to its feet as the 350 Commissioners to the United Church of Canada, entered the room – 349 men and one woman, Mrs. Louis C. McKinsey of Edmonton, the first of her sex to sit in the 'parliament' for the new church, as she was one of the first woman to sit in the legislature of her native province, Alberta.

"On the platform were the heads of the affiliating churches – Rev.S.D.Chown, General Superintendent of the Methodist Church, garbed for the first time in robes of formal black, similar to Dr. G.C Pidgeon Moderator or the Presbyterian Assembly and Rev. W.H.Warriner for the Congregationalists.

"There were really four bodies uniting instead of three, for in addition to the Methodists, Presbyterian and Congregational churches there is a group of Union Churches, in the west, the forerunners of the present union .They came from the little prairie towns (railway station

communities) that could not bide the time of the more slowly moving east. (The denominations in these communities joined together earlier to work more effectively together)."

In Waterford, there were no Presbyterian or Congregationalist churches in 1925, so the Waterford Methodist Church simply became the Waterford United Church on June 10, 1925. Rev. H. Wilkins, who had served the congregation as a Methodist minister, continued on as the United Church minister.
